SHABBOS SERVICES

We have a minyan every **Shabbos morning at 10:30am**. No Minyan for Kabalas Shabbas service on Fridays unless we have a large group of tourists. (Please call the office to verify on Friday Morning). **Minyan for Minchah** on Shabbos afternoon right after Shabbos luncheon, at **2:45pm**.

Times for Kabalas Shabbas service and dinner vary each week corresponding to the earliest Shabbas candle lighting time (Plag HaMincha).

SHABBOS MEALS

The Chabad Campus offers five course Shabbat meals featuring delicious gourmet entrees prepped by a local chef.

Friday night dinners take place sometimes at the Rabbi's home, 1210 East 26th Avenue, for groups smaller than 20 people. For larger groups, dinner will take place at the Chabad Campus, at 1117 E. 35th Avenue. Please call the office at 907-279-1200 on Friday morning to confirm where Shabbos dinner will take place.

Shabbos luncheon is always served at the Shul following Shabbos services.

(All meat & dairy products are shipped by air-cargo from the lower 48 states which adds to the cost).

Gluten Free or Vegan Information: Although we do not have a specific vegan or gluten free menu, the Shabbat meals provide an array of different foods that can accommodate a gluten free or vegan diet. Please indicate on the Shabbat meal form of your interest in a special diet and we can try to accommodate your request.

Friday Night Dinner

\$75 per person. Children under 12 years of age are \$50. Dinner will be served either at the Chabad Campus located at 1117 East 35th Avenue or at the Rabbi's home located at 1210 E. 26th Ave., Corner of LaTouche, off Northern Lights and Seward Highway: 9 blocks from the synagogue. Shabbos Luncheon

\$60 per person served at the synagogue immediately following services in conjunction with the community Shabbat luncheon. Children under 12 years of age are \$45.

Prepaid reservations for Shabbat meals are required. Payments can be made by Check, PayPal, Visa or MasterCard.

Seudah Shlishit (Shalosh seudos) Shabbos third meal is not offered by the Center.

ALASKA TRAVEL PLANNING

KOSHER FOOD/DAIRY PRODUCTS

A Kosher section was established at the Natural Pantry at 3680 Barrow Street (corner of 36th Avenue, off C St., near the Loussac Library). They usually carry a variety of items including: Empire cold cuts, frankfurters, turkey, chicken, chicken & turkey pot pies, Meal Mart frozen meals, J2 frozen Pizzas, Tillamook cheddar cheese, blintzes, cream cheese, smoked mozzarella cheese, puddings and snacks, frozen whole grain Pas Yisrael Ezekiel bread and other items. Frozen Unbaked Kineret brand Challah is sometimes available, and they do carry Kedem Grape Juice. In order to guarantee that the items you would like are in stock, please call Vikki at the Natural Pantry at 907-770-1444 or fax at 770-1445.

In addition, several large grocery stores, such as Carrs/Safeway and Fred Meyer, COSTCO and Wal-Mart, carry the same variety of Kosher OU-OK-CK foods which you would be able to purchase in the large non-Kosher supermarkets in the Lower 48 including: bagels, tuna, sardines, smoked salmon (lox), pickles, potato chips, etc. Manischewitz products, such as matzah, gefilte fish, chicken soup, Pas Yisrael Ezekiel bread, etc. for Friday night dinners are also available. A variety of Kosher wine including Bartenura Moscato can be purchased at Carrs' Oaken Keg, Fred Meyers and other liquor stores. **There are no kosher delis, restaurants, or other places to purchase hot kosher food in Alaska.** Outside of Anchorage, a smaller selection of the same kosher products is available. There is a very limited selection of OUD and OKD dairy products available. There is no chalav Israel.

MIKVAH

Our lavish Mikvah is located at 1701 E 36th Ave. a five-minute walk from the Jewish Campus, the Residence Inn. Mikvah appointments must be made at least two days in advance with Esty Greenberg by calling (907) 301-3243. Mikvah use is \$50.00.

ALASKAN JEWISH LANDMARK

David Green Master Furrier, located in downtown Anchorage, was founded in 1922 by Alaskan Jewish pioneer, David Green, who also served on the Anchorage City Council in 1963 - 1964, and was a close advisor to Governors Ernest Gruening and William Egan.

The Green Family has fanned the flame of Judaism in Alaska for many years and the David Green shop was a gathering place for visiting rabbis who delivered Torah lectures and conducted services.

When Golda Meir—later to become one of Israel's legendary prime ministers—visited Alaska as Israel's Foreign Minister, she stayed with the Green family. They also played host to many VIP's, including Bob Hope, General Westmoreland, Senator Hubert Humphrey, and the Japanese royal family.

It still operates today under the leadership of David Green's grandson and his wife, **David and Shani Green**. The Green family are the founding members of the Alaska Jewish Campus and its institutions: The Lubavitch Jewish Center, the Alaska Jewish Museum and the Gan Yeladim Early Learning Center.

*As 17th of Tammuz is a rabbinical fast and not a biblical one, a more lenient time to end the fast, for those who have physical difficulty fasting, would be at sunset, Thursday night, July 2nd at 11:36 p.m. (or even earlier at 10:30 pm when the ravens and roosters go to bed).

Tishah B'Av – (Fast of 9th of Av) in Alaska Halachic Times and Services

Fast begins Wednesday night, July 22 at sunset, 11:02 p.m.

Schedule of Services at the Synagogue

Wednesday, July 22nd

10:45 p.m. Evening service followed by the reading of the book of Aicha, Book of Lamentations.

Thursday, July 23rd

10:00 a.m. Morning service (without Tallis & Tefillin) followed by the reading of the book of Aicha, Book of Lamentations.

8:00 p.m. Minchah afternoon service (Tallis & Tefillin are donned)

Fast ends Thursday at 12:16 a.m. (early Friday morning) *

*As Tishah B'Av is a rabbinical fast and not a biblical one, a more lenient time to end the fast, for those who have physical difficulty fasting, would be at sunset, Thursday night, July 23rd at 10:59 p.m. (or even earlier at 10:30 pm when the ravens and roosters go to bed).
